MISSION

The Minority Serving Institutions/ Community-Based Organizations is a project that aims to prevent and reduce substance abuse and the transmission of HIV/AIDS among college students and neighboring community members between the ages of 18-24. We reach out to at-risk communities in Cameron and Hidalgo counties with the determination to reduce risky behaviors and prevent HIV infection by providing education and timely referrals to services. The project provides health education by implementing the peer-outreach and the community health worker/promotora models.

Our program provides a 30 day follow up after the intervention with the intention to build trust and reduce stigma of HIV/AIDS. This follow up is to see if risky behaviors were minimized in order to prevent infection.

Our project indicates that risky behaviors associated with substance abuse are among some of the factors in the spread of HIV/AIDS infection in our communities. We provide educational resources on prevention for young adults, their guardians, and the whole community.
